

Broadway Cup 'n' Cork

100 Broadway Avenue



Broadway Cup 'n' Cork is the spot to have a great cup of coffee with homemade sweets; or socialize over an adult beverage and savory dishes.

Suitable for all ages, the shop

serves specialty coffee, Italian soda, smoothies, wine, beer and signature adult coffees.

The menu features unique Italian foods to include the "Italian Slopper." The original dish is a take on the renowned Pueblo slopper with a twist, rather than a green chili-smothered burger, the dish is a meatball sandwich served open faced topped with marinara sauce, parmesan cheese and Pueblo Chiles.

Whether you're looking for a morning refresher or an evening delight, Broadway Cup 'n' Cork has something for you.



Solar Roast Coffee

226 North Main Street



Truly one of a kind coffee can be found in downtown Pueblo. As the nation's only solar roastery, coffee brewed at Solar Roast, stands true to the company's name: solar powered.

Solar Roast was founded in 2004 by brothers Michael and David Hartkop (bottom right). At the time, Michael was an apprenticed coffee roaster master, and David was a special effects artist with an interest in alternative energy. Together they built several prototypes that lead to their current solar roaster the "Helios 5" which powers every cup.

The result of the two coming together was the formation of an innovative company whose methods are both eco-conscious and flavor-inducing. Today, the brothers' original technique can be found at their downtown shop in the form of coffee and coffee goods. Their menu also includes bagel sandwiches, salads, desserts and fruit drinks.



Stop in to Solar Roast for a sip of sun-powered goodness. Love it? Buy a bag of their solar roasted beans to take home!



The Daily Grind

209 South Union Avenue



"Killer Coffee and Food to Die For" is the slogan for the coffee shop on Union Avenue affectionately known by locals as "The Grind."

The bustling coffee shop provides an

atmosphere fit for a diverse crowd. With a study room for college students, monthly featured artists and live entertainment weekly, the Daily Grind brings a lot to the table, literally, in its large restaurant style setting.

The Grind also offers a full breakfast and lunch menu which include vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free options. Along with coffee drinks, the shop boasts the largest collection of loose leaf teas in Colorado (bottom right) as well as a large selection of coffee syrups to include sugar free options.



This family-run coffee shop is the place for families, groups of friends or a solo trip for coffee, a place where everyone fits in.



5th and Main Espresso Bar

421 N. Main Street



The 5th and Main Espresso Bar delivers fully on their motto of "Fam, Food, Art, Music." Located in Pueblo's 115-year-old Historic Federal Building, the bar offers its patrons a step into Pueblo's rich past.



The building, which was inducted into the National Register of Historic Places in 1978, has served as Pueblo's former courthouse as well as its former post office.

While the Federal building

maintains its ornate historic architecture and decor, the 5th and Main Espresso Bar offers entertainment of a different yester-year with oldies music played live weekly.

A relaxed atmosphere is created by the lounge style setting and beautiful, culturally-influenced artwork by artists such as Leovigildo Rivera ("El Congero" bottom left).
